


Tennis and Pencil




Jun Togo

Of course, he/she does not treat it as a tennis racket.


Though he/she treats it as he/she perceives it...



The recognition could be wrong.


There is a man.

A person who perceives the man as a thief treats the man as a thief.




Of course, he/she does not treat the man as a clothes pole.
